What struck you most about the Board of Directors Trip?







Two experiences stand out for me. The first was our visit to the girls' dormitory at Soit Sambu Secondary School. The girls sleep 12 to a cubicle, which consists of two sets of bunk beds with three feet of space in between. Despite their extremely difficult living arrangements, these young women are eager to learn and broaden their horizons. FoTZC's priority of raising funds to build more dorm space will enable these students to not only have less cramped sleeping arrangements, but also afford them better study space. The second was our meeting with the women of the Enyuata Women's Collaborative, who spoke of their eagerness to continue to receive training through FoTZC's program to improve their beading and marketing skills - skills which will allow them to earn additional income for school fees and other family needs. By contributing financially to their families, these women gain status within their communities and afford their daughters greater opportunity to attend secondary school instead of being married off at a young age.

Observing the deplorable crowded conditions under which boarding school girls have to live made me fully support FoTZC's fundraising priority: constructing a new, more spacious dormitory for these young women. Second, watching Maasai women organize and run a maize mill to which women villagers can take their sacks of grain to be ground instantaneously, rather than doing it laboriously by hand convinced me that FoTZC's modest monetary investments in this project have made a tremendous difference in people's lives. Finally, experiencing the difference between the interior air quality for Maasai homes which have new, smoke-reducing stoves, and homes that have traditional, open-hearth fires was a wonderful example of what a big difference small monetary donations and technological changes can make in bettering people's lives.

The most striking thing to me was **observing what seems to be a profound cultural shift occurring within the Maasai community.** Maasai families are choosing to educate their daughters instead of having them marry young to receive a dowry. This choice creates an immediate economic hardship for any family, but collectively, over time, the community will benefit from higher education rates. This shift creates a need for well-built, community-supported schools with satisfactory housing to attract teachers, as well as adequate dormitories to house students.

I had not visited any FoTZC projects since I visited Tanzania with my family and joined the FoTZC Board in 2000. It was important to me to see the physical effects of our work, as well as its impact on the communities and the obstacles to these communities reaching their goals. There is no substitute for visiting our projects in Tanzania and hearing from community members how these projects have helped and what needs remain. It helped us learn from the communities how we can best partner to advance education and women's empowerment.

Two things really struck me during this trip. First was how long it takes to implement projects in Tanzania. Leading up to the construction of our projects, we do a great deal of meticulous planning. Detailed work goes into every project, and it was enlightening to witness the process first-hand. The second thing that impressed me was watching our dedicated, volunteer board members visit our projects. They were able to connect with Tanzanians at each project and ask insightful questions about involvement and lasting benefits. These processes ensure that our projects will be impactful for many years.

GANAKO SECONDARY SCHOOL

Entrepreneurship Seminar Location: Karatu

The Harriman family, who is working to build Michela's Room at the Ganako Secondary School in honor of their daughter, worked with Dennis Hanno, the Dean of Babson College to start an entrepreneurship seminar. In March of 2012, FoTZC helped provide funding for Dean Hanno, seven Babson students, two Babson graduates, and four adults, including Kristen Wainwright and Rick Harriman. to teach entrepreneurship to 80 students. The seminars based at Ganako were quite successful. Students who were reluctant to speak in English at the start of the week were confident enough to present their business proposals in front of the group of 80 by the end of the week. The Harriman family is exploring the idea of making this seminar a more permanent program.

STOVE PROJECT

Phase One Location: Loliondo

FoTZC funded the construction and installation of 50 smokereducing stoves. The expert stove-makers we funded have worked alongside local women to complete this project's first phase. Small teams of women have been taught how to construct and maintain the stoves: they are now able to build stoves and sell them at a profit. The learning process, however, was challenging. While the women took to stove construction quickly, they had a hard time with the idea of making a profit off of the stoves they built for other local women. We will likely partner with them soon on another phase of this project.

AYALABE PRIMARY SCHOOL

Two Classrooms Location: Karatu

In 2009, we built two classrooms at Ayalabe and poured the foundations for three additional classrooms. In mid-2009, Jane Moore, a past guest of Thomson Safaris, began raising funds for two additional classrooms. Thanks to Jane's hard work, we completed and furnished these classrooms. and lane, her husband, and two of their friends traveled to Tanzania to dedicate the classrooms in August, 2012. The dedication was attended by many community members, and the local Member of Parliament was the guest of honor at the celebration.

2012 PROJECTS

BEADING & BUSINESS SEMINAR

Location: Loliondo

FoTZC sent Cecilia Naisula Kashe, a Maasai woman, to work with four women's groups on beading and business skills three times in 2012. She taught the women not only new beading patterns and skills, but also spent time teaching them how to make their work look newer and cleaner. This included learning proper hand-washing skills, how to properly store their materials, and how to arrange their wares to make shopping easier for customers. We look forward to watching these women progress under Cecilia's tutelage.

Nainokanoka PRIMARY SCHOOL

2-in-1 Teachers' House Location: Nainokanoka

We started working at Nainokanoka in 2001, and we are impressed by how much the school has progressed. The community has figured out how to leverage government funds to complete projects at the school, including a new dining hall. Nainokanoka has been in need of additional teachers' housing in order to increase their teaching staff, so we were happy to build a 2-in-1 teachers' house prior to the start of their new school year.

SOIT SAMBU SECONDARY SCHOOL

Girls' Dormitory Location: Loliondo


Soit Sambu Secondary School serves four FoTZC-supported primary schools. The students who attend Soit Sambu Secondary come from a vast geographic area, so the majority of the students live in dormitories. The existing girls' dormitory is built to house 48, but there are currently 160 girls living at the school. They sleep two per bed, and four girls sleep on the floor between each set of bunk beds. Not only is it crowded, but disease spreads more readily among the girls in such close quarters. Building a second girls' dormitory will ease this overcrowding and help improve the health of the students.













We are now working with a Tanzanian consultant, Happiness Mwamasika, to help our specifications. Happiness is a former member of FoTZC's Board of Directors, and has her Master's Degree in Sustainable International Development from



Brandeis University. We are thrilled that she is our boots on the ground in Tanzania!

2011 FINANCIALS

OLOIPIRI WARD

Medical Dispensary, Loliondo

In 2010, the Enyuata Women's Collaborative told FoTZC that their top priority was to build a medical dispensary (a walk-in clinic). The community members, village governments, and ward government all affirmed the dispensary as a community priority, as the nearest existing health facility is 20km away. The district and regional governments agreed to provide staff, supplies, and fund all of the dispensary's operating costs if FoTZC builds the dispensary building and staff housing. This dispensary will serve more than 6,000 people.

Estimated Cost: \$100,000

SUKENYA PRIMARY SCHOOL

2-in-1 Teachers' House, Loliondo

We constructed one 2-in-1 teachers' house for Sukenya in 2010, and the school was able to increase its teaching staff and its educational standards. In 2010, Sukenya was ranked 51st out of 59 schools in the district; in 2011 it jumped to 9th out of 59. The community has requested an additional teachers' house, as the Sukenya student body continues to grow.

Estimated Cost: \$45,000

ORKIU PRIMARY SCHOOL

Two Classrooms, Loliondo

In 2011, we completed a 2-in-1 teachers' house at Orkiu, enabling the school to add to its teaching staff. When we visited the school, we learned that it has half of the necessary classroom space for the student body. While half of the students are in class, the other half must wait outside on the cold, windy plateau, which can cause health problems for the students. We plan to construct two additional classrooms at Orkiu. **Estimated Cost: \$40,000**

OLOIPIRI PRIMARY SCHOOL

2-in-1 Teachers' House, Loliondo


Oloipiri Primary School is a brand new partnership for FoTZC. The school has over 500 students and only nine teachers, so when the community asked FoTZC to build a 2-in-1 teachers' house, we agreed to help. The community is deeply invested in the school; they have begun raising funds for classrooms and teachers' housing, but due to recent droughts, they were not able to begin the teachers' housing and have not been able to complete construction of the classrooms. We look forward to helping this school grow.

Estimated Cost: \$45,000
